The Rev. Ronald Stroy: Transformed by God

My aunt used to tell me, “don’t let other people predict my future. I listened to that down the road...”

The Rev. Ronald Stroy was born August 7, 1971 in Columbus, Georgia. There he attended school, played ball and lived with his parents. “Columbus was not a really big city; it was an ‘adult city’ providing a lot of time for young people to get in trouble.” It was in the streets of Columbus that Ronald Stroy became what he called a “troubled teen.” “Children want to be like the people they see in the community who drive the nice cars, wear the expensive clothes and have all the women. They are not always aware of what goes on behind the scenes, what has to be done to maintain the lifestyle that catches their eye. When you don’t want to take the route of education, the call of the streets leads to trouble.”

For so many years people told Ronald that he was going to be dead by 18. He heard so much negative talk; yet, he has an aunt who continued to tell him that he could change his life if he did not let people predict his future.

As a people of faith, and a people of color, we are, in a very real sense, not unaccustomed to times of uncertainty and difficulty. Ours is a very rich history and heritage which documents our many successful struggles through adversities. A retrospective look back reveals that we were successful only because we had a strong God at our sides, directing us every step of our way. The song writer Isaac Watts was correct as he penned the great hymn of the church, "Amazing Grace," "Thro' many dangers, toils and snares we have already come. It was grace that brought us safe this far, and grace will lead us home" (paraphrased). It has been by the grace of God that we are where we are now, and it will certainly be God's grace that will lead us to where God wants us to be.

We are encouraged in these economically stressed times, these times of so much uncertainty, to trust in our God Who is not constrained by the circumstances that confront us, nor is He limited in His ability to "make a way out of no way." You and I are able to rejoice in spite of what the situations are because we know that God is ultimately in charge. While we are incapable of many things in and of our own strength, we know from personal experience that we "can do all things through Christ Who strengthens us."

As the redeemed of the Lord, you and I are encouraged to tell a dying and disparaging world that the answer to this world's problems resides in the One Who made the world in the first place. With God on our side we are able to make it through these times and whatever other times we might have to face in the future. While others may be in great despair, let us, the children of God, rejoice and thank God for His presence with us. God truly is the center of our joy. We will not allow Satan to steal that joy from us. To God be the glory for the great things He has done and is still doing! Let the redeemed of the Lord say so.

RICHMONDERS INVOLVED TO STRENGTHEN OUR COMMUNITIES (RISC)

On April 20, 2009, Good Shepherd Baptist was the host of the annual Nehemiah Action meeting for a group of congregations called RISC or Richmonders Involved to Strengthen our Communities. RISC works to bring congregations together to answer the call in Micah 6:8 to "do justice" and get to the root causes of some serious community problems.

Good Shepherd joined RISC last fall and had over 200 people at the Nehemiah Action. All together, there were over 1,000 diverse representatives from 16 area congregations at the Nehemiah Action. There, we received commitments from Mayor Dwight Jones to support funding for an evidence-based substance abuse treatment program in the Richmond City Jail and commitments from VCU Health System to make primary care more accessible for the low income uninsured using \$108 million dollars of state and federal funds made available to VCU to compensate their care for the uninsured.

Over the summer, RISC will be conducting an Investment Drive to continue our work together and will begin conversations to discuss community concerns as priorities are set for the year at the Annual Assembly in the Fall. Rev. Stroy's day of reckoning came at the age of 21. Ronald was badly injured, stabbed for something he did when he was 18. His take on the stabbing is "you reap what you sow." While in the hospital, faced with surgery and the loss of his gall bladder, Ronald realized that he did not want to die, he wanted to live! Prayer changes things and Ronald's life from then on took a very different direction.

Rev. Stroy says that it was the divine intervention of God in his life that took him from being a "troubled teen," to a minister of the Gospel who did ministry with teens. Ronald accepted his call to the ministry in 2000, responding to a voice he had been hearing since 1996. He joined the Temple of Glory Community Church in Savannah, Georgia where he was licensed into the ministry by Bishop Matthew Odum in August of 2005. While at the Temple of Glory, Rev. Stroy served as the Youth Pastor from 2005-2007, serving over 300 youth.

Bishop Odum suggested that Ronald volunteer with "troubled teens" and it was in that environment that Ronald's "calling" became apparent to him. Rev. Stroy feels called to work with troubled teenagers with a light for change. The experiences of his teen years allow him to relate to teenagers who should not let other people predict their future. Currently, Ronald is a staff supervisor for Intercept Youth, an assessment home for troubled boys ages 10 - 18. In this organization Ronald lives out his calling daily.

Rev. Stroy says that he "loves his life" because there were times when he did not think he could have the life that he lives today. Rev. Stroy met his wife, LaShirl, in Columbus. LaShirl grew up in GSBC and is the daughter of our own Mrs. Nellie Jones.

Ronald and LaShirl were married at Good Shepherd on April 25, 1997. (Ronald remembers almost passing out in Pastor Smith's study on his wedding day.)

Ronald and LaShirl are the proud parents of two children, Destinie, age 9, and Ronald, Jr., age 3. The Stroy family relocated to Richmond and joined GSBC where Ronald is currently serving as the co-director of the Youth Fellowship and is the newest Associate Minister.





Family Night Dinner was held on Friday, May 1, 2009. Members who attended wore the colors designated for their age group and shared their talents.



Volunteer Recognition

National Volunteer Week was celebrated April 19-25, 2009. Volunteers all over the country were celebrated utilizing the theme, "**Celebrating People in Action.**" On Sunday, April 26, 2009 volunteers at Good Shepherd were recognized for the many tasks and responsibilities they perform in the church, school and the community. They were paid a tribute and awarded a "Payday" candy bar for their diligent and unselfish services.

It goes without saying that you are extremely important as we seek to be a beacon light in this community. You make a tremendous difference in the lives of our members and in the lives of those in our community."

Volunteer of the Year – 2009

The "Volunteer of the Year," for Good Shepherd Baptist Church is Deacon Emma R. Pittman. She was recognized for her wonderful works in the schools, the churches and the community. Mrs. Pittman, a 1993 Phillip Morris retiree and co-operator of E&D Catering, is known for her untiring and committed service in the schools, in the churches and in the community.

In schools, she serves as mentor/tutor at Woodville School and in other capacities including assisting with the Annual Christmas Dinner. She volunteers at All Saints Catholic School for various events.

At GSBC she serves as a member of the Deacons' Ministry, Women's Fellowship, Evangelism Committee, and Salome Ministry. She cooks for Vacation Bible School, assists with Homecoming and provides food for other church functions and events. Deacon Pittman brings desiring seniors to Sunday worship service. Mrs. Pittman sits with and visits sick, shut-in and bereaved members.

She sends a variety of cards on a weekly basis to persons in need and monetary gifts to college students. She offers telephone prayer ministry for anyone in need.

In the community, she picks up and distributes 58 bags of groceries for seniors. She cooks, takes food, care bags and clothing to the homeless shelters for men and women. She prepares fruit baskets and care packages for home bound seniors. Deacon Pittman also visits and prepares care packages for residents in Central State Hospital. In addition, she sends cards and monetary gifts to prison inmates. She donates food to various churches in the community. She drives seniors to the doctor, the grocery store and to the drug store to pick up medicine. She purchases fresh vegetables and meats for family and friends throughout the year on trips to North Carolina. When visiting NC, she prepares and takes food to family and friends. She prepares food for bereaved families, as well as for friends and family in Richmond. Most have been recipients of Emma's generosity.

She supports the Motherland Ministry. This group provides support for persons in Kenya by supplying funds to dig wells for fresh water, provides tuition for students and assists in other areas to help make life better for our brothers and sisters in Africa. Mrs. Pittman is a member of RISC (Richmonders Involved to Strengthen our Communities).

Deacon Pittman promised God that if He allowed her to retire early to take care of her sick husband, that she would do more. She is certainly fulfilling this promise with the Holy Spirit guiding her to look in right direction.
